Residents mark spring with changing miracles of nature

Birdwatching favorite pastime of many

Many readers of this newsletter and followers of the BBLA Facebook page are fascinated by the recorded observations of lake activity whether it be the loon count or ice out. Knowing when natural events occur each year gives us a sense of place and time. When the world we live in seems crazy, knowing nature will be on schedule to gradually change the seasons is comforting.

I love the summer solstice, the day when the most daylight is recorded as it was this year on June 21. I marvel at the light lingering in the northwest sky until nearly 11 p.m. and wish that I could follow the dying light around the world. That is just one of the markers that informs us about the natural changes occurring without our input.

Ice-out occurred on April 24, 2022. There are those around the lake who place bets on when the ice will go out. Back in the 1950s, the Grey Eagle School District had a fundraiser for summer recreation by placing an old car on Big Birch Lake and selling chances as to when the car would sink. I remember going with my dad to sell tickets even though I did not know why they were being sold. After just one year on BBL, the site was moved to Bass Lake just east of Grey Eagle. Ice-out brings joy for people as they have permission to imagine time on the water.

April was never warm but rain and strong winds loosened the ice. Meteorologist reported recently that we are not imagining that the winds have been stronger than normal. They indeed have been since the beginning of 2022. June alone was reported to have winds at 16 percent above normal for the month.

With the lake free of ice, the loons returned and set about the business of reproduction. Those responsible for placing the floating loon nests were met with loons ready to get on board. Many other waterfowl stopped by on their way to nesting sites and provided us glimpses of birds seldom seen.

Loon are the favorite harbingers of spring because they arrive just as the ice is leaving, and they stay visible for the duration of summer. However, the arrival of other birds also sets the stage for the season. The American robins, of course, are synonymous with spring. I

recently saw a robin attack a squirrel. The robin charged the squirrel three times before the squirrel headed for a tree.

The redwing blackbird arrives at the feeder to get a sunflower seed and then takes it back to its home in the bull rushes. Sometime the yellow-headed blackbird also puts in an early appearance. I counted over 100 American goldfinch feeding on the ground in April. I had never seen so many gathered in one place in search of food. They love thistle seed as do their cousins the purple finch and house finch.

The songbirds we most enjoy arrive in May. Who doesn't notice the distinctive song and beautiful plumage of the rose-breasted grossbeak. They are attracted to the insects, fruits, seeds and to plenty of room to build a nest. Traveling from Mexico and Central America, they often nest high in a tree to prevent predators from reaching the nest.

The Baltimore and orchard orioles arrive about the same time as the grossbeaks. They love grape jelly. In fact, we have had them line up in the branches five deep to await their turn at an energy boost provided by humans.

The arrival of the ruby-throated hummingbird is met with awe. The buzz created by their rapidly beating wings lets one know their presence. With the ability to fly backward, they easily find nectar in flowers and feeders. The hummingbird uses its tongue 15 to 20 times per second to retrieve nectar from a flower.

If we are lucky, we may also get a glimpse of a scarlet tanager, as I did this year, or an indigo bunting, the stunning blue bird.

One of my favorite birds is the purple martin because they come, look for housing and then stay and sing and go about their business of raising young. The first summer I moved to the lake, I purchased a purple martin house from Mr. Anderson of Ward Springs. He and his wife were avid observers of martins. They sold me the house, the pole to install it on and offered instructions about placement to attract the birds. For 16 years I only attracted sparrows. However, the past three years the martins have examined my house and determined it met their standards. The original house

is long gone, but now I can work in my yard with the accompaniment of martins, who, by the way, like having humans present. They are voracious insect eaters and thus help control the mosquito population.

Docks were rolled into the water shortly after ice-out. With such a late spring, people were anxious to see signs of the approaching season. Spring never took hold until late May and early June. Rainfall, measured at 5.81 inches for May, on the north shore was welcome but raised the water level considerably causing shoreline erosion and displacement of docks, lifts and other items located near shorelines. When storms came, the high water only exacerbated the erosion issues not to mention all of the displaced dock sections. Some residents said the spring storms raised havoc with loon nesting as well.

The first half of June had pleasant weather with minimal rain. However, beginning on June 19, a three-day heat wave with temperatures in the mid-to upper 90's and strong south winds, made time outside miserable. The strong winds cut into the amount of time people could be on the water. Even with high fuel prices, people were on the water in droves when the weather permitted which was not the case most of the time. June rainfall was 2.08 recorded on the North Shore of BBL.

The young hatchlings of all sort are visible at the end of June. For the first time, I saw a red-breasted woodpecker fly to a feeder, pick up a sunflower and return to the crotch of tree where it opened the sunflower and fed the nut to a fledgling.

With all the wonders of spring, it is no wonder that heaven seems closer in a house beside the water.

Jackson's recollections of early North Shore property ownership

Jim Jackson, who died this past year, loved the history of Big Birch Lake. What follows are some of his recollections of property ownership on the North Shore. Most of the early owners had a connection to Kansas.

He shared the following information with Sally and Bob Hughes, who are residents of the North Shore, and longtime friends of the Jackson family.

According to Jackson, Kamp Kansas Tent Camping began on the North Shore about 1905.

In circa 1910, W.A. Jackson purchased an ice house from the shore of Sliter Island. (Who knew there was an ice house on that island at one time?) He skidded it across the ice to the North Shore where it became Jackson's first cottage.

A resort called the O Joy Resort was wrecked by a tornado in 1922 in which Mrs. Wilke was killed. Her husband and son were not home at the time as they were in the banking business in Grey Eagle.

G.T. Bohman, (another Kansas resident) and WA Jackson purchased the O Joy property and built two cottages in 1924 from the remains of the building destroyed in the tornado.

One cabin was owned by the Wetzels, Wozniaks, and Fellings among other owners.

The other cabin was owned by Bohman and then owned by Searles, Lee Kutter and Terry Schmid. Ted Schmid, the current owner, tore that cabin down and built a new home.

W.A. Jackson's property was passed to Ed V. Jackson in 1941 and he sold it to Flora Mize in 1957. Ed also purchased the Dewey Fuller cottage in 1950 and rented it to Sara Snowden of Kansas who then purchased it in 1957. That home is currently owned by Steve Neville, which his parents had owned previously.

the mussels. There is a bio film being worked on to apply to docks and boat lifts to prevent Zebra mussels from being able to attach.

Caleb of the DNR confirmed that the BBLA cannot shut down accesses to help with invasive weed spread. He explained that access closure by the DNR is a violation of Federal law.

Caleb discussed in greater detail the legal use of Aqua Thrusters, weed rollers and the use of chemicals in the elimination of weeds.


